Dear Deans:

Thank you for your letter of May 1, 2020. On behalf of the Court of Appeals, I want to assure you that your concerns are, and have been, very much on our minds as we respond to the challenges posed by this unprecedented public health crisis. New York has a long and proud history of welcoming aspiring attorneys from across the country and around the globe, and we value the tremendous contributions that your students make to the New York legal community. Our recent announcement regarding modifications to the exam registration process – unavoidable this year – should not be interpreted as a step away from that commitment.

While the pandemic has affected prospective bar candidates in jurisdictions across the country, the impact in New York – for many weeks the epicenter of the crisis – has been especially severe. Historically, New York tests more candidates than any other state in the nation (typically upwards of 10,000 for the July administration of the exam). However, this year, prevailing health and safety guidance indicates that New York will be affected by ongoing travel restrictions, mass gathering constraints, and crowd density limitations. As a result, our strategy of renting convention centers and other large venues across the state, and seating thousands of test-takers at each site, cannot be safely implemented.

Despite these challenges, we are working hard to accommodate as many candidates as possible – including your students – in a safe and responsible manner. By partnering with New York's law schools, we have dramatically increased the number of testing venues – a measure designed to ensure the safety of all participants by administering the tests in smaller groups with appropriate social distancing protocols. We plan to supplement those sites with several more traditional venues, albeit with a reduced candidate density. While the initial application period has, by necessity, been limited to a subset of candidates, we intend to reassess our seating capacity and application pool on a regular basis with the hope of eventually opening registration to a broader group. Although smaller by our standards, we expect a sizeable seating capacity – quite large in comparison to other jurisdictions. That said, our desire to accommodate as many candidates as possible must be tempered by practical considerations related to feasible test administration, a commitment to maintaining the integrity of the exam and, most importantly, the health and safety of all participants. For those students who cannot take, or opt not to take, the September exam, I

recently announced a temporary authorization program that will permit qualified bar candidates employed in New York to engage in the supervised practice of law pending admission, a program available to many of your graduates.

We appreciate the ideas presented in your letter, many of which have been part of our ongoing discussion. When New York adopted the UBE, we recognized the benefits of its portability and we urge all UBE jurisdictions to explore creative solutions, like those mentioned in your letter, to safely provide seating for impacted students. Candidates are encouraged to consider sitting for the UBE in other jurisdictions that may be better positioned to accommodate test-takers at this time, or to defer sitting until next year. In addition, New York typically seats a number of candidate populations, including foreign educated applicants (nearly 5,500 in 2019), that are excluded by other jurisdictions. Those jurisdictions, many of which administer the UBE, should be encouraged to reconsider their policies to allow for a more inclusive administration of the exam.

Bar candidates around the country are struggling with the uncertainties and hardships wrought by the health crisis and we thank you for your compelling advocacy of their interests. Please know that your schools and your students are very much in our thoughts as we continue our efforts to safely accommodate as many candidates as possible.
